Elizabeth (Liz) Delsandro, MS, CCC-SLP, is a certified SLP and clinical associate professor with the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She was recently a senior clinical speech-language pathologist at the Waisman Center of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, focusing on clinical work in the Autism and Developmental Disabilities Clinic, Down Syndrome Clinic, Newborn Follow-Up Clinic, and the Feeding Clinic. As a clinical associate professor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at the University of Iowa, she supervised graduate student clinicians in working with individuals with autism spectrum disorder in the Wendell Johnson Speech and Hearing Clinic, taught graduate-level courses, and developed innovative programming for children. Delsandro facilitated the China Project for the University of Iowa, providing parent and educator training in the area of autism spectrum disorder. She has worked in the public schools as an autism consultant, an assistive technology trainer, and a direct service provider. Delsandro speaks at the state and national level. Her interests include social communication, functional communication, and emotional regulation in individuals with ASD and other neurodevelopmental disabilities; parent coaching; feeding development in young children; and international service delivery for individuals with neurodevelopmental disabilities.
